April meeting: Shohin Development with Adam Toth

Adam Toth has been studying bonsai seriously for over seven years, beginning with Jonas Dupuich. He more recently studied for three years under Taiga Urushibata at the Taisho-en bonsai garden in Shizuoka. During his time in Japan, he spent a lot of time studying and thinking about growing and producing better shohin and small sized trees. He received an official shohin certificate from the Japanese Shohin Bonsai Association. He's also been leading a number of workshops for EBBS members, so his talent has been a growing influence on our club.

March Meeting Recap

Featured Speaker: Jared Carrion of Bonsai Echo

Our March meeting featured special guest Jared Carrion (@bonsaiecho), who shared valuable insights from his experience growing a successful bonsai business and social media presence with 43,000 followers. Jared's presentation covered everything from marketing strategies to practical tips for selling and shipping bonsai.

Jared emphasized the importance of video content that features faces, quality bonsai material, and engaging music. For those looking to sell their trees, he recommended utilizing Facebook groups like Bonsai Auction and shared that trees in the \$200-300 range tend to sell well, particularly maples and other popular varieties.

One of Jared's key points was that "an awesome tree in a decent pot sells better than a decent tree in an awesome pot" something to consider when preparing trees for sale. He also noted that with proper care and development, a \$20 tree can often be transformed into a \$200-300 specimen within just 2-3 years.

For those considering shipping bonsai, Jared offered this practical test: "Put it in a box, turn it upside down and shake. If nothing falls out, you're good." He recommended the Shipo service and stressed the importance of insuring all shipments.

Jared's wife Kandi also contributes to their bonsai business by creating pottery. Together, they've published over 100 instructional videos on their YouTube channel.

For members interested in starting their own bonsai business, Jared provided a helpful checklist that includes: obtaining business licenses, securing a reseller permit, setting up payment processing (like Square), implementing accounting software, creating a website, and acquiring a nursery license.

He also recommended using Anderson flats for developing stock, noting they're both effective and economical. Placing these flats on the ground allows roots to grow downward, and they can be easily lifted for root pruning when preparing trees for sale.

Protecting Your Bonsai: Essential Insecticides and Treatments

Maintaining healthy bonsai trees requires vigilance against pests and diseases. Here's a straightforward guide to the most effective treatments for common bonsai challenges.

General Insecticides

Safari (Dinotefuran) A powerful systemic insecticide that works from within the plant. Particularly effective against scale and mealybugs that hide in crevices. Provides several weeks of protection but use carefully as it can affect beneficial insects and pollinators.

Spinosad Derived from soil bacteria, this natural option targets chewing and sucking insects while having minimal impact on many beneficial insects. Excellent for caterpillars and thrips. Breaks down in sunlight within days, requiring more frequent application but leaving less environmental impact.

Merit (Imidacloprid) A reliable systemic insecticide that excels at controlling aphids, whiteflies, and certain beetles. Can provide protection for up to 12 months. Like Safari, it's a neonicotinoid, so consider using it primarily on non-flowering specimens to protect pollinators.

Spider Mite Control

Bifenomite (Bifenazate) A targeted treatment that specifically affects mites while sparing most beneficial insects. Works through contact rather than systemic action, so thorough coverage is essential, including leaf undersides. Gentler on sensitive species that might show damage with stronger chemicals.

Pylon (Chlorfenapyr) For severe or resistant infestations, Pylon disrupts mites' energy production. Effectively targets all life stages – eggs, nymphs, and adults – breaking the reproductive cycle completely. Consider this a stronger option for serious problems, and use appropriate personal protection when applying.



Bonsai Calendar

- The first 2-3 weeks of April is generally a slow time for Bonsai.
- It's time for pinching! We tend to pinch the top of the tree to keep it dividing and slow whereas we tend to grow out lower branches for size. When the tree is well developed, Pinching can be done on the entire tree.
- Days are getting longer and warmer, so you'll need to pick up the frequency of your watering. Keep an eye on your soil so it doesn't get dry. Newly repotted trees drain faster, so don't worry about overwatering those.
- Continue to fertilize conifers in April, particularly junipers, depending on how aggressively you want to grow your trees. Wait until May 1 to start fertilizing deciduous trees. Too much fertilizer too early could produce long internodes!
- Check old wiring for biting as trees start pushing growth.
- Rotate trees regularly!

Fungal Treatments

Mancozeb A broad-spectrum fungicide that prevents spore germination. Addresses leaf spots, rusts, and many common fungal issues. Works best as a preventative or at earliest signs of infection. Leaves visible residue, which ensures complete coverage.

Cleary 3336F (Thiophanate-methyl) Offers both preventative and curative properties with systemic action that protects new growth. Particularly effective against anthracnose, black spot, and root diseases. Liquid formulation absorbs quickly with minimal visible residue, making it suitable for display trees.

Daconil (Chlorothalonil) Features a multi-site mode of action that reduces the risk of fungi developing resistance. Exceptional rainfastness once dried, requiring fewer applications during challenging weather. Alternate with other fungicides in your routine to prevent resistance development.

Dormant Season Protection

Lime Sulfur (Diluted 16:1) A traditional dormant-season treatment that serves as fungicide, insecticide, and miticide when trees are leafless. Despite its distinctive smell and temporary yellowing effect, it provides valuable protection against overwintering pests and fungal spores. For conifers, consider using at half-strength to prevent excessive yellowing.

Copper Fungicides Complementary to lime sulfur, offering additional protection against bacteria and fungi during the transition from dormancy to growth. Modern formulations have reduced phytotoxicity risks, but follow dilution guidelines precisely, especially for sensitive species like maples and azaleas.

Integrated Approach

The most effective strategy combines chemical interventions with good cultural practices:

- Ensure proper air circulation
- Water appropriately
- Carefully inspect new additions
- Recognize beneficial insects as allies

Every collection faces different challenges based on climate, species, and growing conditions. Develop an observant eye to catch problems early, and respond with appropriate intervention–using stronger chemicals judiciously and gentler options whenever possible.

Get ready! It's Auction Time!


